

VPSD Submits Plan For 3 New Ambulances In the Community

Supervisors with the new dependent district approved a proposal for 12 ambulances operating in The Villages.

Supervisors with The Villages Public Safety Department Dependent District are asking Sumter County commissioners for about \$11.9 million to fund ambulance transports within The Villages for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1.

Supervisors unanimously approved submitting the budget request to the county at their meeting Wednesday ahead of the required deadline of June 1.

The funding from the county will support 12 ambulances available 24 hours a day, every day of the year in The Villages, an increase from the current

nine available.

Supervisors conducted a final review of their first proposed budget of a little less than \$30 million at the meeting.

A vote on the budget is scheduled for their July 10 meeting.

Sumter County commissioners will have final approval of the budget, which must be adopted by Sept. 15. VPSD supervisors will

propose to Sumter County a budget projected at \$29,996,728. About \$18.6 million of that

is for fire rescue services
